

THE TIMELINE IN NEW YORK

1626 Slavery in New York began when the Dutch West India Company imported 11 African Slaves to New Amsterdam.

1655 First slave auction was held.

1664 British took over the colony.

1690's The African Burial Ground Opened.

1703 42% of NY household's held slaves.

1712, 1741 Slave revolts.

1780 10,000 blacks lived in New York.

1790 By 1790, 33% of blacks were free.

1794 African Burial Ground was closed.

1799 Law for gradual abolition of slavery was passed.

1827 All slaves were freed.

1990 Burial Ground unearthed.

2010 African Burial Ground Museum opened.

2012 The American Slavery Project: Unheard Voices conceived, written and produced.

ABOUT UNHEARD VOICES

American Slavery Project commissioned 17 writers to examine 419 graves of the anonymous men, women and children slaves, indentured servants and free people who lived during the colonial era and are buried in the African Burial Ground in Lower Manhattan. Their names and daily lives have been imagined from the contents of each grave. *Unheard Voices* brings to life a moment in time that might have been and gives voice to those African descended individuals who lived, loved, laughed and endured on the streets of 17th and 18th century New York.


